# **Bull trout in the upper Willamette**

## Fisheries expert Nik Zymonas will be our speaker in person

Our club has taken a special interest in the waters of the Upper Willamette River recently both as a new and relatively uncrowded place to fish, but also as an area of ongoing biological research that has welcomed our participation as citizen scientists.

Adding to our understanding of this interesting area will be **Nik Zymonas** of ODFW's Corvallis Research Lab.



"Sometime

during a youth spent exploring the woods and waters and endeavoring to catch spectacular fish, I evidently lost my footing and got swept into a career in fish biology!" he says.

Since 2008, Nik has been the ODFW Project Leader for the Upper Willamette Bull Trout Project, which seeks to promote conservation of Bull Trout in the upper Willamette Basin through research and monitoring efforts.

He says, "We monitor population abundance, assess entrainment of Bull Trout through dams and promote upstream passage efforts to increase abundance of spawning adults, conduct reintroduction efforts, assess feasibility of sites for future reintroduction efforts, and study other potential limiting factors such as pathogens and angling related mortality."

Currently, Nik is branching out to work intensively on Oregon stream temperature research and monitoring efforts. Prior to ODFW, he worked on various desert fishes in New Mexico, Bull Trout in the lower Clark Fork drainage in Montana and Idaho (Montana State University), various salmonids in Southeast Alaska, White Sturgeon and other fishes in the Hanford Reach of the Columbia River, and groundwater in Wisconsin.

## Awards presented at our annual meeting


With so many active members doing so much for our club each year, both visibly and behind the scenes, it's not easy to figure out who

    - Central Intelligence (Library/ listserve) — Carolyn Mason, for making a living library available to all, and protecting the gateway to other club treasures.








## Fourth annual Cleawox Classic will be Feb. 24

# **Annual Munsel Mash** is Saturday, March 16

All McKenzie Flyfishers and their guests are once again invited to our annual rain-or-shine

outing to Munsel Lake on the coast Saturday, March 16.

Munsel Lake can be reached off Hwy. 126 by turning up the North Fork Siuslaw Road and then left onto Munsel Lake Road, or by driving north from Florence on Hwy. 101 and then east onto Munsel Lake Road. Munsel is about 62 miles from Eugene and about 90 minutes via Hwy. 126 and North Fork Road.

In the past, many of you have gone straight to the lake in order to limit out (five trout)

before lunch is served at 1 pm; however, your Munsel experience can also begin with an no-host breakfast at the Three Rivers Casino at 7:30 am where you can obtain the sustenance and caffeine needed to get your flotation device on the water, often for the first time in over a year. The casino is just west of the intersection of Hwy. 126 and the North Fork Road. The casino coffee shop serves breakfast. There is a lot of room for boat trailers in the parking lot.

According to the rumored-to-be-reliable 2024 ODFW stocking schedule, 3,000 "legals" and 150 "trophy" rainbow trout will be stocked in Munsel Lake during the week of March 11-

15, which promises plenty of new fish and maybe a few holdovers. For coastal lake tips and fishing advice, check out the informative "Cleawox Classic" newsletter articles, and the information in the club website "Events & Outings" page. The Cleawox fish come from the same hatchery as for Munsel.





Contact the fish master (me) before noon on Friday, March 15, if you plan to attend the traditional lunch of hot dogs, beans and maybe brownies at the Munsel boat landing at 1 pm March 16. A signup sheet will also be available at our regular club meeting at Gratitude Brewing. Those of you who would rather try your luck
