Nymphing for success

Expert Garrett Lesko takes a more traditional approach

Tired of hearing too much about Euro nymphing? This program is for you! This is a

non-Euro presentation on the traditional and latest in nymphing techniques.

Did you know that 90 percent of a trout's diet is from subsurface feeding? And usually near the bottom of the river or lake. That means nymphing will almost always catch more fish. And our April speaker will talk about exactly how to do that.

Nymphing is not what brings most fly anglers into the sport, but it is an incredibly effective way to catch fish. In this presentation **Garrett Lesko** will break down the many ways of presenting your nymphs, gear to use, flies to tie/buy, and other helpful tips on how to get into or improve your nymph game. This way you can be part of the 20 percent of anglers catching 80 percent of the fish.

Garrett is an Oregon-based fly tyer and fly fisherman. He has been featured as a "Master at the Bench" in American Fly Fishing Magazine,

Those of us who attended our March

meeting in person had a ball. Lots and lots of visiting with fellow members, sharing stories, telling lies, drinking and eating and, oh yeah, bidding up the many highquality donated goods and trips in our annual auction. Another successful year of (mostly) internal fund-raising

in the bag, making it possible to continue the McKenzie Flyfishers tradition of providing financial support to our regional nonprofit fishery resources organizations (more on this below). Thank you, fellow members, for your awesome generosity.

We have two service opportunities coming open for members to volunteer, and I'm asking you to consider taking one of them to support your club. Both are currently handled by Carolyn Mason, who is expanding her role with Casting for Recovery and needs to free up some of her time to do so. Carolyn will continue to take care of Keep Our River Clean and the Clean Highway activities, but she is stepping away from Library and Google Services. Library is pretty simple: Keep track of the books, tapes, DVDs, etc. that are in our storage facility, bring select items to meetings for those wishing to check them out, and collect returned borrowings and take them to the storage facility each month. Google Services, aka Listserv, involves oversight of our online functions that are hosted by Google. The primary



responsibility is to monitor and manage the club group email, which includes logging in to the see if messages have been sent to the club email address and then forwarding such messages to the appropriate club member, usually a board member or committee chair. The other main duty is to manage the club's Google Drive content, primarily archiving various documents in the appropriate folders. We also saw a small number of trout heads breaking the surface, but not in numbers that would indicate a big hatch. Now that the big rains appear to be behind us, we should see the flows drop and overall conditions improve enough to induce some quality MB action. Jim Rhoten, our March Brown Outing fishmaster, tells me we have some 14 boaters and 16 passengers signed up for the club March Brown outing period. It's time to pair up and make your plans to float the rivers.

I know you've all been eagerly awaiting this news: the MFF Board of Directors approved the 2024 budget! Kidding aside, it is always nice to be part of a budget process that is not dominated by looking for places to cut expenses. Because of our membership dues receipts and successful auction results, we are in the enviable position of having modest surplus funds this year. The Board approved adding \$750 to our Picnic/60th Anniversary budget to help the committee make it special. (Stay tuned for details of the "special" part, which will be announced as we near the event date.) The remaining surplus will be split 50-50 between supporting our conservation partners and adding to our club's reserves.

We also elected Doug Cottel as club secretary, to complete Lorne Johnson's term. Lorne had to resign from his secretary and board duties in order to care for his wife, who is

undergoing cancer treatment. Good news on that front: Barb Johnson is responding very well to her initial treatment. We wish her well and support Lorne's "family first" decision. And, when you see Doug be sure to thank him for graciously stepping in.

Greg Pitts, 1948-2024

Greg Pitts of Eugene, who was president of the McKenzie Flyfishers in 1992 and went on to be president of the Federation of Fly Fishers, died of cancer Saturday April 6. He is survived by his wife, Mary Jo Pitts, and their son. Greg was a real estate developer who, at one time, served as a fishing guide on Oregon's Deschutes River. A full obituary is not yet available, but we know he was born Dec. 27, 1948 and lived in Tucson, Arizona before moving to Eugene. This photo of him some years ago

Auction raises record revenues

We had a remarkable annual auction March 20, thanks to Greg Williams and his crew, and

by the time all the analysis was done, our net income was a little over \$9,000, after expenses of around \$500. For comparison, Greg says, we cleared about \$10,000 in the huge 2019 auction, but our expenses then were around \$4,000, and it took about five times more work than this year's auction. This year's biggest auction item was a fine wooden drift boat donated by Mark Rauch that sold to Bill Neel for \$2,000.

Raffle winners were

Mike Matthews for the dry fly basket and Spence Reid for the Big K getaway. Auctria recorded all the digital raffle tickets, and all Greg had to do click an "Award Prize" button. "We used the same payment/delivery method that worked well for us last year," Greg says. "Next year I intend to rebuild the auction website, and better security will an important part of the job."

Greg had a lot of help behind the scenes from Steve Brehm, Doug Cottel, Al Eckerdt, Tom Fauria, Steve Hackett, Jim Rhoten and Roger Stover. "Thanks guys! We couldn't have done it without you. And my deep gratitude to everyone for your financial support, your enthusiasm and your friendship," he says. "The auction is a hard job, but the payoff is well worth the input. Thank you for allowing me to be of service to the club." Greg was still working on the final data for the auction. Here's one fun fact: We sold 34 boxes of flies for a total of \$1,537. The boxes contained a total of 485 flies, for an average bid value of \$3.17 per fly.

There were four lucky winners of the incentive auction. These fellows had \$100





deducted from their auction bills. In one case, the total was less than \$100, so his bill was eliminated entirely. Dan Podolsky (14 tickets), Mark Rauch (37 tickets), Jim Rhoten (10 tickets), and Phil Johnson (11 tickets).

The incentive auction calculated points for our 57 bidders (plus 11 registrants who did not win anything). Tickets were given for registration, biding once, each donated item, each won item, each raffle ticket purchased, and each cash

donation (there was only one since this function did not work the night of the auction). There were 391 total tickets awarded.

"I'm not sure if this raffle catalyzed any significant action among the members, which was the point of the thing," says Greg. "We'll need to decide if this is something we want to do next year."

Greg Gore commented, "What an awesome job you have been doing for the club with the auction, everything is always smooth going and easy to follow! Thanks again for all your work."

Bob Bumstead said, "Amazing, Greg. Your work is heroic. It not only nourishes the lives of our members, but also those of our community. Just think of all those young students whose lives have been enriched by their experience in Salmon Watch." — *TJT*


Crooked River bonanza May 3-4

Overview: The Wild and Scenic Crooked River is a small tailwater known for its

abundant fish and varied bug populations. Just east of Bend, the Crooked flows out of Bowman Dam and through 12 miles of beautiful rimrock canyon. Join us May 3-5 for riverside camping, or stay nearby in Prineville, Redmond or Bend. Dinner together will be Saturday night.

The fishing: The Crooked is open yearround and follows the Central Zone stream regulations: flies and lures only, no bait. It's all wade fishing and it's known for having mostly small fish and there are lots of wild Redband Trout and Mountain Whitefish in the 6- to 12inch range. The river is also known for its turbidity, often looking cloudy as its nutrient-rich water flows from Prineville Reservoir, usually around 250 cfs. Close to Bend, the Crooked can get



though a wading staff is recommended due to slippery footing. Shallow indicator nymphing and Euro techniques produce the most hookups, and dry-fly hatches are varied and profuse. A list of recommended flies will be provided later but small midge, mayfly, caddis and scud patterns are great.

Gear recommendation: A 4- or 5-weight

rod with a floating line is perfect or bring your light Euro setup. Waders with felt-soled boots will be best.

The camping: There are abundant BLM campsites along the river, all first-come-first-served with picnic tables, pit toilets, fire rings and no water. Fishmaster Stevie and wife, Gail, will be at Palisades Campground 15 miles south of Prineville on Hwy 27. Directions from

Eugene: A three-hour drive will take you up the McKenzie, over to Sisters, through Redmond to Prineville. Stock up in Prineville for last minute supplies and water. Take Hwy. 27 south 15 miles to Palisades Campground. If you stay in Bend it's a 45 minute drive. Note: don't go to "Crooked River Campground" since it's not nearby.

There is a ton of info about the Crooked online, and our club has had several speakers

Our club's traditional Liars Lunch met in person for the first time in years April 5 and the


lively, noisy gathering drew 18 club members. We might repeat this gathering every first Friday, either at this restaurant or another.
